DCAC BUDGET PREPARATION TIMELINE



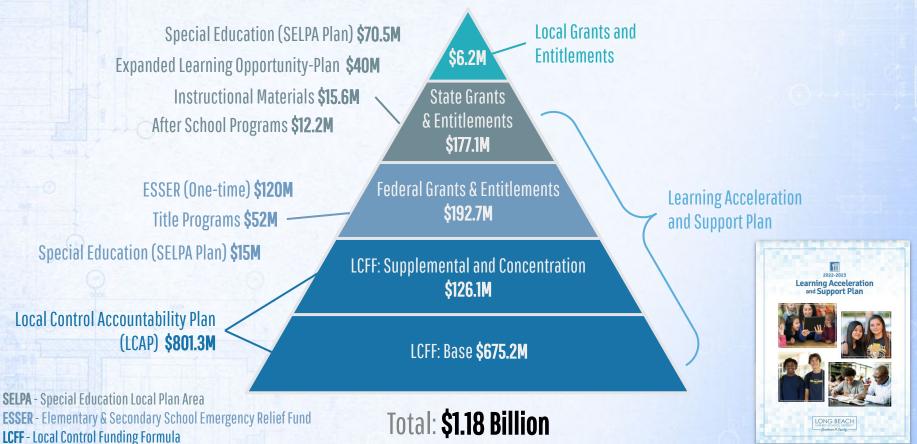

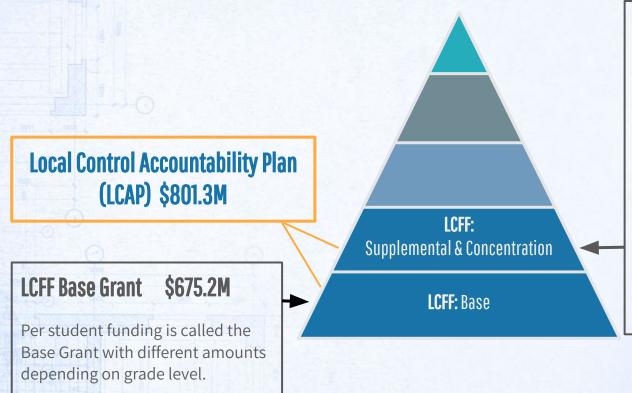

4.2	College and Career Readiness	Expand college and career readiness efforts by providing additional support for the Long Beach College Promise, including: College visits to Long Beach City College for fourth graders and California State University, Long Beach, for fifth graders; Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID); College advisors at high schools; Dual enrollment opportunities such as the Ethnic Studies Program with the California State University, Long Beach; free PSAT and SAT exams; HS Summer School.
4.3	Advanced Placement Support	Provide teachers to increase the number of AP classes and pay for nearly the entire cost of AP exam fees.

5.1 & 5.2	Pupil Services	Pupil Services in Goal 5 is divided into a base (Action 5.1) and supplemental/concentration (Action 5.2) line items because of the nature of their services. Action 5.1 is the base allocation of counselors and nurses . Action 5.2's focus is additional nurses, health assistants , and psychologists whose site-based function provide more specialized coordination with the School-Based Mental Health Collaborative and other community partners due to their socioeconomic challenges, language barriers, and unstable home environments.
5.3	Middle School and High School Wellness Centers	Maintain Wellness Centers at each high school so that students have a safe place on campus where they can drop in to receive social-emotional support during the school day.
5.4 Er	Male and Female Leadership Academies gagement Priorities:	Academy participants receive culturally relevant and responsive mentorship; attend workshops and events that build their leadership skills; engage in community service projects; and benefit from individualized academic support. <i>Tutoring; Mental Health Supports; Enrichment; EL Supports; Interventions</i> 20

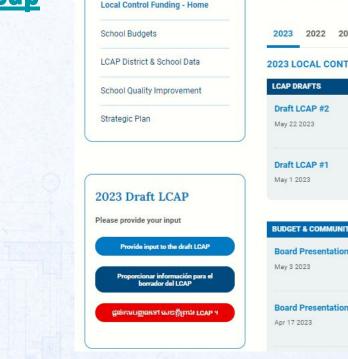
